Homework

The working group is continuing to review the policy and link with faculties for the approach on homework. We are working on resources to support parents and carers to have a clearer understanding on how they can support their young people with homework. We will share the updated policy with parents and carers as soon as we can.

Communication

The communications group have been working on several aspects. These include – Letters to parent's and carers being updated, school app being utilised to share news, messages and the school calendar, the website continues to be progressed and a spart of this process we are reviewing the purpose of the website, where information can be found. As these are progressed, we will update all parents and carers.

Parents Evening.

We will be consulting parents and carers across all year groups in relation to the format of these, for academic session 2024-25. These will then be included in the school calendar, which will be issued to parents and carers in August, as well as being accessible on the school website and app.

Parent / Carer Survey

As shared at the last parent council meeting, we will be reintroducing the parent and carer survey. We are currently updating this and I propose to share this with the parent council at the meeting at the end of March. This will allow an opportunity for feedback before it is sent out in the summer term. This will provide feedback to be linked into the School Improvement plan for academic session 2024-25.

School Policies

We are working on a section of the school website, to be able to share all appropriate policies that parents and carers would require access to. We hope to have this in place as soon as is possible. We will then update with new or revised policies as appropriate. As discussed previously we will be seeking feedback from parents and carers in relation to new or revised policies going forward.

Excursions

There are now a number of excursions taking place and it has been pleasing to see the pupils being afforded these opportunities.

We are planning to create an excursions booklet that could be issued / shared with all parents and carers in June for the following academic year. This will allow all parents and carers to have an overview of the opportunities that will be available over the pupils' time in the school. This will also support planning and budgeting to support access to the opportunities that are made available. The CEC excursion policy is now being implemented and this will be reviewed, and information shared with officers at the centre to be able to reflect the experiences of schools.

RSHP

We have had requests for the lesson plans and information used in the lessons. This will be added to the school website and will allow parents and carers of pupils in S1,2,3,4 to be able to see the lessons that are delivered in PSE over a ten-week period. Please see the additional document for further information in relation to the lessons and the content covered.

School Dinning Centre

The school dinning centre is a cashless catering provision, where pupils can access lunch and snacks. There is a varied provision, with snacks, including hot pastries being available at breaktime. At Lunchtime there are a variety of hot meals, sandwiches, pizza, cold drinks and fruit. Pupils can pay at the till using their ParentPay number.

I am currently in discussion with the managers of the dinning centre to have more visible signage for pupils to be aware of the cost of all items that are offered. I am also seeking information to share with parents and carers through the school website and school app, the meals that will be available each week and on any particular day.

Rights Respecting Schools

I am delighted to let you know that as a school we have achieved RRSA Silver. The assessors were extremely impressed with the vast amount of work both staff and pupils have put into becoming a rights aware school.

Some key points from the assessors:

Basketball Success

We entered six teams into the Scottish Cup Schools Basketball Competition, S1, U15 and Open in both boys and girl's categories. The teams have all played incredibly well and in the S1 division, both teams managed to become East of Scotland Champions by winning all group games and have progressed to the Scottish Cup Final 4s competition where the top four teams in the country play off to become Scottish Schools Champions. Both S1 teams have played unbelievable basketball and will have a wonderful experience at Final 4s.

Our U15 Boys went through to the East of Scotland Regional Semi Finals after winning all group games but came up against an incredibly strong Queensferry HS team and unfortunately lost narrowly to miss the regional final. Our U15 Girls went through the group stages unbeaten also and after a 3-point semifinal win against Mary Erskine, played Broughton HS in the regional final. An amazing performance saw the girls crowned East of Scotland Champions after a 59-48 win. Our U15 girls now travel to Dundee for the Scottish Cup Final 4s which is an amazing achievement.

In the Opens division, S4-S6 girls have played some incredible basketball and defied the odds by beating Heriot's with only five players. An incredible feat considering the speed and relentless nature of Opens Basketball. The girls reached the semi-final but due to scheduling issues received a forfeit win to progress into the East of Scotland regional final to play Portobello HS. Unfortunately, this game is unable to be played and Portobello progress into the Final 4s. The Open Boys have had a busy campaign and despite a loss to Tynecastle HS, finished second in the group and progressed to the quarter finals. A good win against Queensferry HS set up a Semi Final and a repeat fixture against Tynecastle HS. What an incredible performance for our team, going ten points down towards the end of the first half did not diminish the belief and with seconds to go until the final whistle, there was a chance. Sadly, the final score ended 75 – 79 with Tynecastle progressing into the Regional Final but it was an incredible performance and the best school's basketball performance from both teams.

Best of luck to our S1 girls & boys and U15 girls in the Final 4s in Dundee in the last week of term and well done to all teams for a brilliant campaign this season.

British Brain Bee Neuroscience Competition

Robotics UK Final

Over the weekend the VEX IQ Robotics Team, Pulse Robotics (Jonathan Brickley, Noah Grey, Andrew McKendric, Reuben Murdoch, Leander Patterson and Ian Tong) took part in the UK National Championship event in Telford after being one of only 60 teams from across the UK to qualify for the UK Nationals. Over the two days the team took part in skill challenges (3 driver-controlled attempts and 3 autonomous coding attempts) with only their robots as well as a taking part in the teamwork tournament where they were randomly matched with other teams to work together to score as many points as possible in this year's game. During the weekend, the team further refined their robot design, autonomous code and during their practice runs managed to, on average, increase their points to an impressively elevated level. Unfortunately, due to some bad luck with how some of the blocks landed/hit off each other, they were not able to replicate their high score during the official skill matches. Still, they achieved an impressive 13th place in the skills challenges due to their combined driving and programming skills. For the teamwork matches they were one of 16 teams that managed to qualify for the finals. The teams were paired up with each other and had to score the highest number of points they could. Pulse Robotics and their teammate were able to score an impressive 85 points and ended the Championship in 5th place overall. While it wasn't quite enough to qualify for the world event in Texas, it is a very impressive result for the team's/school's first attempt and for only having 3 months to design, build, refine and code their robot (when other teams have had since last May!). Hopefully, we will see more of Pulse Robotics next year as we hope to take part in the High School VEX Robotics

competition where they will design and build a robot using metal structures and much more advanced electrical components for next year's game!
